SWIMMING LESSONS FOR CLASS TWO

The importance of developing swimming skills just can't be stressed enough. Apart from the exercise value the potential to save life makes it a vital skill to learn. It is now a statutory requirement for schools to report on numbers of children who can swim 25m by the end of Primary School. Unfortunately the five hours that the school can provide for every child each year just isn't enough to fully develop this skill. The onus is on you the parents to supplement this by giving children access to pools throughout the year or ideally signing your child up to lessons at your local sports centre.



Children in Class 2 have made visible progress with all of them now able to put their heads under water, showing increased confidence. It is great to hear how well the more confident swimmers were doing with stroke development, swimming lengths.

African Drumming with Anna Minear

Anna has been joining Class 1 every Monday for the duration of the term to develop their skills in African Drumming. The children have been investigating bass and tone, composing their own rhythms in small groups and producing a collective sound. On their djembe drums the children performed to their audience on Monday 26th March. Anna was delighted with their overall attitude and focus, producing powerful rhythmic pieces. The children also wowed the audience with poly-rhythms, African songs and a beautiful improvised interpretive dance.
